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
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Thursday 29th October: Brixton Tate Library needs friends...

6-30 pm in the library, Brixton Oval

The Friends of Tate Library and Windrush Square functions as a sub-committee of the Brixton Society. The Society has long had close relations with the library, which has played a full part in many events in the old Tate Library Gardens, and is determined to do so in the enlarged Windrush Square in the future.

However, what has been missing for some time is the active involvement of library users in a group dedicated to helping develop the library itself. Many other Lambeth libraries have such groups that do sterling work with their libraries. To see if there is interest in such a group for the Tate Library, there will be an open meeting in the library on Thursday 29th October, starting at 6-30 pm – all welcome.



A different Brixton landmark heads this issue —the Railway Hotel in Atlantic Road is the subject of a bid led by the Brixton Community Trust to restore the building to active use. The original drawing appeared in The Architect magazine in April 1881 when the building was newly completed.

Bid for Townscape Heritage Initiative

The Prince's Regeneration Trust has been supporting the bid to renovate the Railway Hotel as a focal point for the community. It has become clear though that its surroundings also need some kind of lift, so the trust has also proposed a THI scheme for the Town Centre. The Heritage Lottery Fund has run 185 such projects since 1998, but they are rare in London, where most Conservation Areas tend to attract investment naturally. Brixton though has had long periods of "planning blight" due to unrealistic plans deterring smaller-scale investment. The fund would provide c. £2.6m which can be used to restore features, fill gaps and generally help put some life back into local landmarks.

You can do any activity that helps to improve the quality of the environment in your local area, for example:


- Painting and brightening-up local areas and properties to make them visible and safe.

Town Centre Focus



Art in Lambeth was the theme of this year's Open Day at Lambeth Archives last month, so here's a chance to own a piece of local art. Despite threats of redevelopment, Granville Arcade (Brixton Village) is still much as painted by local artist Anthony Eyton for a London Underground poster some 15 years ago. We inherited a supply of the posters when the Brixton Challenge programme closed in 1998 and can supply copies for only £2 each — use our order form on the website or ask at our next event.

Road –works update:

Work on remodelling Windrush Square started on 26 May and is presently expected to complete in January 2010. The basic layout is already evident.

However, changes to the road system and pedestrian crossings around the St. Matthew's Church island will not be finished until late in 2010.

Night working starts on 11th October to resurface the roadways. From **Sunday 15th November** there will be 2-way traffic in Brixton Hill outside the Fridge. The pedestrian crossing outside the Town Hall should be reinstated before this date.

The section of St. Matthew's Road linking Effra Road to Brixton Hill will remain one-way for the time being.

Ideas to boost the Markets

Back in July, the Friends of Brixton Market hosted a "Meet the Market" event at the Town Hall to build all-party support among Lambeth Councillors. Market traders laid out a great spread of food to show the diversity of what's on offer.

Since then, the Friends have been trying to tap into the Council's public art programme around the market and town centre, being run through the Regeneration Team.

Some ideas are already being explored but the Friends are also talking to the market traders and customers, and inviting more suggestions. Ideas so far include:

- Pope's Road entrance is currently obscured by stalls but it could be more of a beacon or gateway, drawing people along Pope's Road. FBM have been talking to local artists about this and hope to make something happen soon.
- Atlantic Road arch: FBM would like
 to open up the final railway arch (a
 former fishmonger's) between Atlantic
 Road and the forecourt of Granville
 Arcade, possibly with a light
 installation or mural. For pedestrians
 access below the railway bridge over
 Coldharbour Lane is narrow and
 unwelcoming. Initial contact with
 Railtrack has been positive.
- Shutter painting possibly a competition/ festival to paint the shop shutters, maybe with talented graffiti artists.
- Wheely Bags: Would it be good if there was a rack of free customised wheely shopper bags that people could take away and bring back?
- Secret Sculpture: Could we get a load of small scenes hidden around the market that people would have to look for? Kids would love it...

Local History Focus

The end of Brixton plc - absorbed by Slough

Back in 1924 an industrial estate was opened at the north end of Brixton Road, between Camberwell New Road and Cranmer Road. Part of the Brixton Road frontage had been occupied since 1907 by a garage for the General Motor Cab Company, who were provided with a larger garage in the new development. This was the start of a business originally known as Brixton Estate Ltd., who went on to develop other estates for light industry and warehousing over the next 80 years, around London and the Midlands.

In the early 1980s, there was a proposal to replace the Brixton Road site by a Tesco supermarket, but not pursued due to local opposition. The early emphasis was on industrial users such as Crompton Parkinson, making lamps. Recent occupiers have included offices for charitable organisations and rehearsal rooms for the National Theatre.

In recent years the firm's name had been simplified to Brixton plc and their flagship developments were mostly in easy reach of Heathrow Airport.

Like a number of developers, they were caught out by the recession, when the falling value of their properties no longer covered the loans secured against them. Several estates were sold to pay off loans but in the face of a bleak outlook the board had to accept a takeover by their competitors SEGRO, formerly known as Slough Estates. Staff of the merged firm are now being cut from 225 to 135, likely to be concentrated at Brixton plc's old head office in Berkeley Street, W1.

Effra Parade c.1935

Gill Rayner recently sent me this photo to confirm the location of the Royal Oak pub, from which this coach party is about to depart. Her grandfather James Kent used to live in a cottage in Effra Parade in the 1920s, and later in Brailsford Road SW2.

In fact the pub stood on the corner of Effra Parade and Dalberg Road, until it and adjacent shops were destroyed by a flying bomb in 1944. In another picture, on page 80 of the History of Brixton, part of the ruined corner is still visible in 1951, just before the LCC built flats on the site.

The other side of the tracks

The Milkwood Road area is separated from Brixton by the railway line between Herne Hill and Loughborough Junction Stations. In many ways it's a typical slice of South London but a recent book compiled by the Herne Hill Society manages to capture many facets of local life. In addition to the history of how Milk Wood came to be replaced by terraced houses and industry, there are many personal stories that bring the neighbourhood to life.

Publication of **Milkwood Estate – the story of a Lambeth community** was supported by a grant from the Capital Community Foundation, which has helped keep the price to just £5 for 140 pages, plus 50p p&p if ordered via the website, www.hernehillsociety.org.uk

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Green Spaces and Green Issues

100 years of Growing your own

Over the past year, there has been a lot of local interest in urban food-growing. Practical workshops run by Food Up-front at the Vida Walsh Centre have been well-attended. TTB's Abundance Project has reinstated some of the allotment plots between the blocks of flats at the Guinness Trust Estate in Loughborough Park and has been running practical sessions – their next is on **Saturday 7th November**, from 11 am to 3 pm when they will be planting garlic and an apple cordon. Of course this is nothing new, as highlighted by an exhibition running at the Garden Museum (in the old parish church next to Lambeth Palace) through the winter until 7th March.

It traces the story back to the Allotment Act of 1908, and naturally includes the efforts made in two World Wars to "dig for victory". It also features responses to the Great Depression (post-1929, not 2009!) and early attempts at self-sufficiency in the 1970s. Open daily 10-30 to 5 pm, admission £6, concessions £5. Tunnelling under Brixton

For some time, Thames Water has been carrying out major sewer renewal work around Brixton. This previously affected Ferndale Road to the west, and Barrington Road to the east. The focus has recently shifted further south, with mysterious excavations being conducted in a compound on Rush Common opposite Arlington Lodge, Brixton Hill.

More extensive works have been underway around Railton Road, where several side streets have already been excavated. In most cases the original clayware sewers are being replaced by larger concrete pipes – in the case of Talma Road the 300mm (12 inch) diameter pipe laid in the street in the 1870s has been replaced by a 450mm diameter pipe. Work has lately moved up to a grander scale, with 5m diameter shafts being sunk in Leeson

and Chaucer Roads. Another will follow shortly in Shakespeare Road, in order to tunnel from each shaft to create a much larger sewer under Railton Road.

Although the local population is probably less than a century ago, modern lifestyles place greater demands on the sewers – more baths and showers, and particularly use of washing machines and dishwashers, as well as more paved areas to provide car parking or "patio" style gardens.

Myatt's Fields Park News

Myatt's Fields Park was among 6 Lambeth parks which were awarded Green Flags this summer to recognise their standard of safety, cleanliness and attractiveness. This is a national standard, originally promoted by the Civic Trust.

The Little Cat Cafe has been run through the summer by volunteers (backed-up by more volunteer cake-makers!) who have raised enough money to pay for equipping the hut to serve drinks and ice creams, with a little to spare for further development. Opening will now be limited to special events until next summer, with the aim of launching it as a sustainable business in due course.

Conservation Areas at risk

During the summer, English Heritage drew attention to widespread decline in these areas that should be receiving enhanced protection. Lambeth aims to review all its current CAs as recently done for the Town Centre, but expects this process to take 5 years.

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Notes and News

The Brain of Lambeth Quiz - Thursday 22 October:

Veteran Car Run – Sunday 1st November:

The Annual London to Brighton run will once more see a series of old cars struggling up Brixton Hill in the early morning. This year 500 pre-1905 cars are expected, including 100 guest vehicles from overseas. With the first car due to leave Hyde Park at 6-54 am, cars are expected to pass the Town Hall between 7 am and 9 am.

Replacing the Civic Trust

There have been wide-ranging discussions among amenity societies like ours about filling the gap since the demise of theCivic Trust in April. New arrangements are taking shape but some key issues are still to be resolved.

For local amenity societies, the Civic Trust provided a national umbrella body offering recognition and a reference point for advice, though resources were usually too thinly stretched to offer much beyond a modest magazine as encouragement. In recent years, better guidance and training in environmental issues, town planning processes and the organisation of community projects have become available through other bodies like BTCV, NCVO, CABE, Planning Aid for London and our own Lambeth Voluntary Action Council. Green issues and Green spaces seem to be amply covered by the London Sustainability Exchange, London Parks and Green-spaces Forum and a range of web resources. The London Forum of Amenity

Societies too has been active with Londonwide planning issues. London-based societies need not lack encouragement or advice, though perhaps it's a lonelier prospect for groups in smaller provincial towns.

The Civic Trust offered an **insurance** package to member societies, but we found the scheme offered by the British Association for Local History to be more economical and sufficient for our range of activities.

The Civic Trust Awards have already taken on an independent life and nominations only recently closed for next year's awards. For details see www.civictrustawards.org.uk

Finally, that leaves the national lobbying and promotional role that the Civic Trust pioneered. Again the scene has become more crowded with other overlapping bodies involved, and a new organisation may struggle to make itself heard in the corridors of power. Links between the local societies and the national trustees were quite tenuous, with an implicit assumption that everyone shared the same values, so it was difficult to feed grassroots concerns into national policies of either the Trust or the Government.

On balance then, the gap to be filled looks a lot smaller now, and any new national body will have to work alongside others. It can only justify itself though if its member societies have a say in running it and see some results from their involvement – the old model of top-down steering by the great and the good can no longer cope in the 21st Century.

Thanks to everyone who supported our bookstalls at recent events – here's how we got on. At the Lambeth Country Show, our new shelter stood up well to the unsettled conditions, and our total takings over 2 days were £416. On 26 September we managed to cover two events simultaneously. Archives Open Day seemed less busy this year but we took a useful £51. At the Stockwell Festival in Larkhall Park we touched on fresh ground and brought home an encouraging £113.

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
